From The Pastor

It is clear from the gospel documents that Jesus did not promote a low-sacrifice message. His own life modeled it, and those who follow him have known deep down that whatever else we believe, a life of service and sacrifice is essential to the Way of Jesus Christ. In a multitude of ways, local church members have lived out that kind of life. To paraphrase former House Speaker Tip O'Neill, all service is local.

We all recognize the stresses of our time, much of it financial. But the suffering of this world is larger than finances alone. While we often feel helpless to solve the BIG world-wide problems, we are not helpless to take on local suffering. This church is well situated to model such service on the ground level, for we are part of a ministry that has served in this place for longer than any other Baptist church in America.

From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required, said Jesus (Luke 12: 48). That statement takes on new life in the present. This is not just a stewardship concern, it is a theological concern. Our culture is hungry for the kind of leadership the church is well equipped to provide. Now is the time for the church to shine! Now is the time for the church to model humble service, faithful living, and generous giving.

At the first meeting of Tom Wiles' small group, Improv Your Faith, we filled out a questionnaire in which he asked us to rate various aspects of church life. Interestingly, he then asked how we think the congregation would rate these same aspects! I wish the whole congregation could fill out the form – it would be interesting to see how people feel about these things. As you know, at our last quarterly business meeting, it was decided to have a retreat to do some long range planning. I think these are some of the things we might consider. One of the categories that stood out for me is discipleship – one of 'those words.' Is discipleship important to us? Just what is it anyway? Webster's defines a disciple as one who accepts and assists in spreading the doctrine of another. It's not a word that we use often but I think in fact we do indirectly try to train disciples. To me that means training people to accept God's love and pass it on to others. One way we do that, of course, is through the sermons. I think our small groups are also important. We have a lot of small groups: the two spirituality groups that meet weekly, the Sunday Forum, the choir and last but not least our committees. We have a diverse congregation in terms of ethnicity, education and economic status. Diverse people working toward common goals learn a lot from each other about not only accepting differences but seeing that they can compliment each other. Sharing and learning together in small groups and working together on committees helps us to learn to love our neighbor.

And have you noticed in the last 10 years how much our missions activities have grown? We not only contribute to missions but participate in missions. Some of us go to La Romana to help build the hospital there, some of us work with the refugees we are helping to support, some of us make sandwiches for Crossroads and most of us bring in food stuffs for the food pantry. There is always a lot more that we could be doing. Do we need to be more intentional about discipleship? I don't know—something to think about.

Sarah Dunn, the soprano section leader of the choir sang the spiritual "Didn't My Lord Deliver Daniel."


