

# From The Pastor...on Kumbaya

The recent glowing reports of summer camp and the experiences of the children and leaders prompted me to think about the old song, "Kumbaya." It has been as important for campfires as s'mores for as long as most of us can remember. It is a prayer, "Come by here, Lord," and it comes from the Gullah language heritage. (The Gullah live in the low country of South Carolina and Georgia and are descendents of enslaved Africans.) It was a soulful cry for divine intervention on behalf of a suffering people. "Someone's cryin', Lord, come by here."

During the 1950's and 1960's it became a standard of the folk music revival. Everyone seemed to record it: Pete Seeger; the Weavers; the Seekers; Peter, Paul, and Mary; Joan Baez—you name it. Still, it retained its character of a gentle prayer for the Lord to attend to the needs of us all: the crying, the laughing, the singing, the praying. It was an emotional, soft-voiced anthem of togetherness. It evoked courage.

Now, however, it has morphed into something none of us could have imagined during our camping days. It has taken on the character of a sneer by politicians and some of the talking heads of TV land. Rather than representing strength and power in togetherness as it once did, the song has come to represent weakness and wimpiness. Derision of Kumbayah has become sign of toughness and pragmatism in American culture these days. As one columnist recently said: "What do we do...when faced with an implacable radical enemy? Just sit around, sing 'Kum Ba Yah' and hope these bad guys will leave us alone?"

The distortion of Kumbayah from an experience of strength in togetherness to a term of joking and derision is sad, but not surprising. It reflects the sharp divisions and cynicism in our country today. But for me, and I hope for the church in general, Kumbayah still has its power and inspiration. We can be as tough and pragmatic as anyone, but Kumbayah still maintains its relevance, especially in these cynical times. *Kumbayah*, *my Lord*, *Kumbayah*!
