

FROM THE PASTOR

Where shall I go from your Spirit? And where shall I flee from your presence? The questions asked by the psalmist (Psalm 139) were, of course, meant to touch all of us, for we all go and we all flee at some point in our lives. But the answer given by the writer is swift and comprehensive: If I ascend to heaven, you are there. Of course, we all expect God to be in heaven. That's like saying, "If I go to church, I can find God!" But the next thing the writer says is arresting: If I make my bed in Sheol, you are there? Sheol! The ancient idea of the land of the dead? God is there? Is God there in those times of life when you are convinced there is no hope? You are there, says the psalmist.

Then comes the most powerful image of all: *If I take the wings of the morning, and settle at the farthest limits of the sea....* In a time and place where sun worship was common, it was thought that the rising sun in the east was flying through the sky on *wings of the morning.* All through the day, they believed, the sun flew through the sky, until at the end of the day the sun flew right into the *farthest limits of the sea*, the place where no human could reach, the place where they believed sea monsters dwelled.

The psalmist declared what the story of Jonah told in a different way: *even there (there? Of all places?) Yes, even there your hand shall lead me and your right hand shall hold me fast.* So wherever you wander this summer, even to the *farthest limits of the sea*, don't be surprised if you sense the divine presence, leading you, protecting you, guiding you.

So for the next couple of weeks I will put some brochures out on the welcome table. The RI Baptist Peacemakers meet bimonthly on a Sunday afternoon at 1:45 at a church of one of the members. The date for the next meeting has not been set yet but I will put a notice in the Spire when it is. Anyone is welcome to join us!!

For those of you who were not at the forum, the RI Baptist Peacemakers are part of the Baptist Peacemakers Fellowship, an organization founded by Baptists from Canada, US, Puerto Rico and Mexico to provide international perspectives on peace and justice concerns. They support peacemaking work by raising the visibility of peace efforts; bringing peacemakers together in regional and international gatherings; and providing resources, speakers and training to members. They connect with peacemakers from other traditions, faith-based and secular, to build alliances and work together toward the common goal of a more just and peaceful world. The RI group has sponsored two workshops in the last two years on conflict transformation and is active in promoting legislation to reduce gun violence in our state. It also sends interested members to peace camp every year for training. Our church has hosted a concert to raise funds to support those going to the camp this year. In Memory of

James Dunn

We received word this past week that James Dunn died on the 4th of July. James Dunn was the Executive Director of the Joint Baptist Committee for Religious Liberty from 1981 to 1999. The Joint Baptist Committee represents a whole bunch of Baptists denominations in Washington, DC, advocating for religious liberty and serving as a lobby for Baptists views and interests.

Those of us who have been around here for some time know that James Dunn was a great friend of this church and preached here on several occasions. I knew him on a first-name basis, but he was a long-time personal friend of Dan & Libby Ivins, and Libby worked for Dunn when he was the Executive Director of the Joint Baptist Committee. He had a west-Texas accent that could compete very well with Dan Ivins' east-Tennessee accent. Dunn was profound and funny, and he was the one who

said, "Baptists have only one creed, and that is "Nobody can tell me what to believe, except Jesus." *Stan Lemons*


Anson McCurdy

The church learned this past Sunday that Barbara McCurdy's husband Andy had been stricken and died the day before while sailing his boat on the bay. They were husband and wife for fifty-one years since being married on July 2, 1964 while Andy was serving in the U.S. Army in Germany. They originally met several years earlier at Clark University where he had studied marketing.

Anson McCurdy was seventy-five years old and was son of Archibald and Grace McCurdy. After his army service, he worked at Wyman-Gordon Company in North Grafton, MA for thirty-five years, becoming the sales and marketing manager for turbine products of the company. He was a leader in the titanium industry and served as president and director of the International Titanium Association. After retirement they moved to Portsmouth. Andy was an active layman in St. Barnabas Church in Portsmouth, and Barbara was a member of First Baptist Church, gathered by her ancestor Roger Williams. In addition to Barbara, he is survived by his sons James and David and their wives and two grandchildren.

A Mass of Christian Burial will be celebrated on Saturday, July 18 at 10:00 a.m. at St. Barnabas Church, 1697 East Main Road, Portsmouth. The burial will be private and contributions can be made in his memory to St. Barnabas Church.


