

The Steeple

On October 24th, I had the pleasure to talk about the Meeting House in conjunction with a panel discussing teaching history using historic places in Providence. This occurred at the Fall Meeting of the New England Historical Association hosted by Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven. As I did the research about the Meeting House for that presentation, I learned new information that I wanted to share with you. The steeple's design had been taken from James Gibbs's *Book of Architecture* (1728) [See figure below, left-hand side], one of the rejected models which had been proposed for St. Martin's in the Fields, London.



The steeple was unique for its time, in that other 18th century New England Meeting Houses did not have steeples—ours was the first! It was erected in a little more than three days as reported by the *Providence Gazette* newspaper: quite a feat for 1775! The sections of the steeple were placed on the building's frame and then the smaller sections were lifted like a reverse telescope from inside. It stands 185 feet high and is the only wooden steeple in Rhode Island (knock on wood) never knocked over in a hurricane!

The steeple makes a statement atop the Meeting House, which today is the largest wooden frame building standing in this country. Illuminating it has been part of the congregation's responsibility since the beginning of this century. As many of you know, the fixtures installed in 2000 had started to age, break, and need constant attention. Thanks to a congregational vote this past August, it was agreed that the monies would be spent to install modern LED fixtures to illuminate the steeple. Robert O'Donnell and Sons did the work in October. I had the great pleasure to see it the first time as I drove to the Meeting House the evening of November 4th. The new lighting is spectacular and I cannot urge you enough to come into Providence at night so you can see it. Not only do the new lights show off our exquisite Meeting House in all its glory, but they reflect the grand and glorious tradition of the First Baptist Church in America and its legacy of religious freedom to the United States.

He is writing to the clergy who believe that it would be better to let the locals use the system to create change. King believes tension is needed to force the system to act. He could be writing to us today. I invite you to read King's letter in preparation for our discussion of what we should do as individuals and as a church to promote equality..
