Rhode Island Religious Leaders Call Christians to Prayer

As leaders of majority-white churches in Rhode Island, we want to be clear: there is no place in Christianity, or in our country, for a belief that white people are superior or deserve preference and advantage over other people. White supremacy is sin. It rejects the teaching of the Bible and the traditions of the Church, teachings and traditions that our churches have many times failed to observe. Systems that perpetuate racial advantages for some and disadvantages for others are sinful. We must repent so that we all can be restored to a right relationship. God created us all, and because of that we are all of one family (Galatians 3:26-29). If one part of the family suffers, we are all suffering, for we are all children of the same God.

Over the weekend and the days that have followed, we have all seen the unmasking of long-hidden and often-ignored strains of racism and hatred of the other. We have seen self-professed Nazis carrying burning torches shouting slogans that we hoped had been consigned forever to history and insulting our Jewish neighbors. We have witnessed racially motivated violence, clergy peacemakers being beaten and spit upon, people being injured and killed. This is not of God. This fresh eruption of racial violence and hatred must be resisted by people of faith.

Our call to resist drives us to our knees in prayer. St. Paul writes in his letter to the Ephesians that we as members of the Body of Christ contend with the principalities and the powers of this world (Ephesians 6:12-13). As people of faith we have been given authority over the forces of darkness and hate, but it is an authority that is expressed by loving actions and selfless service to people who are being rejected by the powers of this world.

Our response as members of faith communities is first to be clear in our rejection of racial violence and systematic preferment, and second to pray for God to bless the work of reconciliation that can repair the damage that has been done.

We call on people around the State of Rhode Island, in Christian faith communities small and large, to join us in prayer:

"God of all the nations, who created us of one blood, and who invites us all to be part of the Beloved Community; strengthen us to work for racial reconciliation and peace in our community. Use us to be peacemakers and to help restore all to right relationship to each other and to you. Give us wisdom when we speak and courage when we must act. We ask this in the name of your Son, our crucified and risen Lord, who conquered once and for all the evil powers and principalities of this world. Amen."

Reconstruction of the north steps of the Meeting House is in progress. The poured concrete base of the steps and some of the brownstones are in place.


Construction equipment rested on Sunday and the cast iron railings await their return to the steps.





Our tenor section leader, Samuel Brunner presented the special music on Sunday, August 13, singing "Deep River" and "Every Time I Feel the Spirit." A large crowd of people attending the 2017 NecronomiCon gathered at the Meeting House for the convention's opening program. This is a biennial gathering of scholars and fans of H.P. Lovecraft who was a major figure in the founding of horror and science-fiction writing. The NecronomiCon likes to start each time at the Meeting House because Lovecraft especially loved the building, prowled in it, and even tried (unsuccessfully) to play "Yes, We Have No Bananas" on the organ.

Lovecraft's mother and grandmother were members, and he attended Sunday school here until he was expelled for being an atheist. In light of the recent events at Charlottesville, Virginia, various speakers at the convention were going to deal with the fact that H.P. Lovecraft was virulently antisemitic, believed in white supremacy, and despised the evolution of the United States in modern times. One reason that he loved the Meeting House was that it represented Colonial America before immigration brought large numbers of Catholics, Jews, and others that he held to be inferior to the British stock of Yankee New England.





The picture of Lovecraft was taken in 1898, when he was 8 years old, about the time he was expelled from Sunday school for siding with the lions against the Christians.

I literally have dreams where hundreds of signals are seen. As my dreams go, that is by far the most attainable. You are helping make the dream come true and can help with further advocacy for GNL.

Last Wednesday night saw an amazing display that kept kids signaling well beyond the Magic Minute. The East Providence Harbormaster boats seemed to inspire pleasure craft on the Providence River to join in to the surprise and delight of kids and families at HCH. Slight timing delays or extensions of signals allow for kids to more fully take in the show. The "GOOD NIGHT HASBRO" scrolling message at the top of 100 Westminster has become an anticipated end to the display as is the "launching" of the First Baptist Church in America spire "rocket" at 8:35.

Efforts are being made to turn occasional building-to-building signals on the Rhode Island Hospital campus into something more regular, possibly nightly. Other Providence icons are being invited to join and there is strong interest from the Big Blue Bug ownership as well as that of the Superman Building. There's also more effort being made to get guests at Providence hotels to get in on the fun as well as residents of down-city sky-scrapers.
