May 7: Colleen and Larry Whelpley and Morris presented an Adult Forum program on their work in training service dogs. The dogs spend the week at the ACI and weekends with the Whelpleys who expose the dogs-in-training to the experiences in the world. The dogs learn to be unafraid of all sorts of things, such as loud brass instruments on Easter and the pipe organ.





**May 14:** This is a simnel cake made by Ruth Marris Macaulay. Simnel comes from a Latin word for wheat flour. It has 11 balls of marzipan on top to represent the disciples (minus Judas). It was traditional for what is called Mothering Sunday in England which takes place on the 4th Sunday in Lent and was a day that servants could go home to visit their families and their mother churches - it was only later that it became more focused on mothers.

May 21: Rob Jarbadon gave guidance and instruction in the Adult Forum about use of the defibrillator, CPR, epipens, and the first aid kit; how to call 911 (what is essential to get the fastest response); how to recognize when someone suffering from a stroke, what to do when someone is choking or have an epileptic seizure. Ruth Marris Macaulay took notes while Colleen Whelpley, for the Christian Education Committee presided.

### IT'S TIME TO SHARE

A LETTER FROM YOUR WORLD RELIEF OFFICER



Dear American Baptist Leaders,

This scripture held special meaning for me in the past year. Quite possibly it did for you too. War in Ukraine persists, communities from Kentucky to Puerto Rico are in the throes of long-term recovery from tornadoes, floods, and hurricanes, while wildfires continue to imperil western U.S. states. And those are just a few of the life-changing hardships people faced in 2022. In the midst of it all, American Baptists have responded through One Great Hour of Sharing, and we are seeing the harvest indeed.

American Baptists have given generously to OGHS — Ukraine Relief — \$1,366,000 in the past 11 months. Those funds have been used to provide relief for the people of Ukraine—those that have remained within the country and those that have sought refuge in neighboring nations. During a recent call with Rev. Igor Bandura, Vice President of International Ministries' Baptist partner in Ukraine, Rev. Bandura shared about the continued hardships the Ukrainian people face. And he also shared these thoughts/glimpses into the life of the Baptist churches in Ukraine today.

Most churches are full on Sundays despite the fact that half of their members have left.

- There have been 3,000 baptisms in the last 6 months of 2022; 25,000 new people are attending churches.
- On seeing God in the midst of war... "It is hard to go through a war. Really hard. And it's the best time for people to see the power of God."
- On the future of the Baptist Union...."We continue to think about, dream about, and plan for our future."
- On the transformation of the local church... "This war has brought a real chance to reform our churches. Our churches were good before the war. But we've become better."
- On the Union's own transformation...Before the war, this Baptist Union, made up of 2,300 churches, had an organizational capacity that

was huge, but did no projects on a national level. Now they are coordinated to deliver a multi-million-dollar humanitarian relief program across their country. They never had to do anything like this. Now they not only know they can do it, they are doing it—and they developed this capacity under all the pressures of war.

• On compassion...."Before the war, when we heard about war or hard things in another part of the world, we prayed. Yes, we prayed. But this war has allowed us to truly understand compassion. Ukraine as a country will emerge from this war a more compassionate people."

Does any of that surprise you? It surprised me. What a harvest indeed! As I write this letter, two massive earthquakes have rocked Turkey and Syria. Within days of the earthquake, Rev. Bandura shared that the Baptist churches in Ukraine are taking

up offerings to help their brothers and sisters in Turkey and Syria. In the midst of their continued hardships, they are not fatigued doing good—they are responding to "a time to share" for others in need.

It is our time to share again, as you so faithfully have for so many years! Your giving provides hope and healing—and as we are witnessing in Ukraine, it can be the catalyst God uses to bring forth change within the church and within a nation. Let us not be fatigued, for we are witnessing this gospel truth: "At the right time we will harvest a good crop if we don't give up, or quit."
