Last month in the space, I mentioned a longstanding dream of our building having a one-seater-gender-neutral accessible toilet. Why does this matter? If we truly aspire to be a place that welcomes all people, we need to work to make what we have more dignified for our community while in the Meeting House. Currently, if one is unable to manages stairs, one cannot access restroom facilities while in our building. We know that bodies can change in the blink of an eye, and at any given moment, any one of us can find ourselves in need of an accessible facility. Recently, a visitor asked if her trans daughter would be welcome among us. I said she would. However, some non-binary folks and others prefer gender neutral bathrooms. If this were an easy fix, we would have already addressed it. Our way is to welcome all who come to our church, yet at this point, our theology and hospitality outpace our facilities. Due to the historical nature of the Meeting House, some of our options are constrained. However, we are a living congregation and not a museum. We possess sufficient imagination and historical integrity to accommodate the past and future within our walls. In order to continue to live into our call to be the church in this moment, we need to seriously consider how we can meet the needs of our community now and going forward. It will be an investment, and one that will return dividends in dignity and ministry to all kinds of people. The saints who preceded us in this church looked and built towards the future needs of our community. May we, in this moment, possess similar vision and resolve, and continue to construct a church that is both theologically and tangibly welcoming to every kind of body.
