

Missions and Outreach



On Saturday, November 15th at 10 am, Rick Wild, a volunteer manager at Crossroads, will give us a tour of their facility. Crossroads is located at 160 Broad Street in Providence and is the leading provider of housing and services to those experiencing homelessness in Rhode Island. There is parking in the rear of the building; and since it is a Saturday, there should be plenty of space to park. He will meet us there and then we will tour the old building (the former YMCA) and visit their new building across the street. The Summer Street Apartments have just opened and provide new and improved housing to the current residents of Crossroads' Tower apartments, expanding their single-occupancy rooms to fully-furnished, one-bedroom apartments. If you are interested in visiting Crossroads, please sign up in the Fellowship Hall.



Starting the 9th of November, we will be collecting funds for AIDS Care Ocean State. This organization provides services to over 500 persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families in Rhode Island. It is also the largest provider of subsidized housing for persons living with HIV/AIDS. It currently has 127 clients residing in 48 apartments that the organization owns and operates. If you would like to support their work, you can donate by writing a check to FBCIA with "AIDS Care" on the memo line or by donating in one of the church envelopes and writing "AIDS Care" on the outside.



143,000 Rhode Islanders receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance or SNAP food assistance benefits every month. Judges ordered the federal government to continue providing food assistance during the shutdown but benefits will still most likely be interrupted. In addition, there is confusion about how long recipients will have to wait for this vital support. Food banks are desperate to provide help to families struggling with food insecurity. Our support of the Better Lives Rhode Island food pantry is especially important now. Bins are at the top of the stairs as you enter the Meeting House. The need is great; so please, consider donating.



Blessing Bags

This month, we need sanitary wipes for our Blessing Bags. We include these wipes with peanut butter crackers, granola bars, bottled water and socks in bags to distribute to individuals in need. You can leave these items in the bins in the Fellowship Hall. And please, take bags to distribute.



We are also collecting supplies for Youth Pride Rhode Island. Youth Pride hosts a community pantry that serves over 700 youth each year. The pantry is open during the week for young people in need of food,

clothes, toiletries, and/or school supplies. These items are free for them on a weekly basis. You can donate these in the Fellowship Hall.

250th Anniversary of FBCIA Building

On October 11 and 12 the church celebrated the 250th anniversary of the construction of the Meeting House with an all-day program of lectures, tours, panel discussion, exhibits of arts and Meeting House ephemera, a visit by "Roger Williams", organ and choir music, and the preaching of Janet Cooper-Nelson, the recently retired Chaplain of Brown University.



John McNiff, retired National Park Ranger of the Roger Williams National Memorial, spoke as Roger Williams about issues of religious liberty in the context of England in the 16th and 17th centuries.

Trish Woodward, president of the Roger Williams Family Association, had a chat with her 10th great-grandfather, Roger Williams [a.k.a. John McNiff] in the Fellowship Hall.

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C. Morgan Grefe, Executive Director of the Rhode Island Historical Society, presented an illustrated talk on the world of Roger Williams before he and his wife, Mary Williams, came to New England.

Stanley Lemons, Historian of FBCIA, showed some the many uses of the iconic image of the Meeting House in etchings, photographs, postcards, calendars, advertisements, book covers, souvenir plates and tiles, menus, placemats, posters, and newspaper and Baptist publications.





Charlotte Carrington-Farmer, Professor of History at Roger Williams University, gave an illustrated talk about Mary Bernard Williams, the overlooked wife of Roger Williams.

IThe Proteus String Quartet played music for the prelude to the morning worship service and then accompanied the organ and choir in the anthem "We Built This House," composed by Jonathan Sturm who was a member of the church and choir from 1986 to 1991.

Naledi opened gifts while Georgi beamed. Pastor Jamie enjoyed the sight.


